













NDU in North America!

While much has been written about the growing value in preparing students for living and working in an international social and cultural context, Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) has actively engaged in adapting its programs and the composition of its faculty and students toward internationalizing its campus. Various plans and actions have been implemented. New faculty members from different backgrounds have been recruited; cross-border initiatives targeted at building an international platform have been launched. These include: cooperation and development projects, institutional agreements and networks, mobility of faculty through exchange (field work, sabbaticals, and consulting work), recruitment of international students (student exchange programs and semester abroad), twinning partnerships, and joint research.

To ensure that students from all backgrounds have the opportunity to attend NDU, we established two foundations in North America: one in the United States (AFNDU) and another in Canada (CFNDU). Both foundations help develop partnerships between NDU and North American universities, corporations, community groups, friends, and alumni to assist the University in its mission for diversity and world-class education.

In our Strategic Plan 2015-2020, growth is a major driver, particularly in the areas of the core curriculum, advancement, and infrastructure. The Liberal Art Curriculum (LAC) program has been revised not only to help students understand the international core issues, challenges, and potentials but also to develop intercultural skills and critical thinking necessary for life-long learning competencies. Also, new buildings and impressively equipped housing facilities have been added only to ensure that international students enjoy an environment conducive to learning.

This issue of the Chronicle is released just as the University takes a new leap ahead in its outreach plan. On March 1, 2017, NDU appointed the Director of Development in North America Mr. Fady Garabet, a friend of NDU, who shall perform his duties with the

promptness and diligence expected of an experienced and committed administrator. The outreach efforts to date reveal a snapshot of what has been achieved in fostering the international community at NDU. The successes that have taken place, amid rapid changes, will serve as the foundation for more endeavors.

As President of NDU, I look forward to 2018 with great optimism. I am equally certain that the continuing momentum of NDU's outreach plans in North America will yield results in the coming years that are even more significant.

NDU in the Global Business News

Lebanon's Business Community Can Act as a Catalyst for Peace in the Middle East, Concludes Beirut Forum

Lebanon is on the front line of some of the world's most intractable conflicts. Syria lies to the north and east, and Israel, which Lebanese euphemistically call "our southern neighbor," is to the south. Yet this small republic of 4.5 million people is today a relative oasis of peace, despite a civil war that lasted from 1975 to 1990 and claimed 120,000 lives. Muslims, Maronite Christians and Shi'ite Hezbollah paramilitary forces (the occasional target of Israeli rocket attacks) live side by side. At the same time, one in five people in Lebanon is a Syrian or Palestinian refugee.

Lebanon is sometimes known as the Switzerland of the Middle East, and could be a catalyst for peace in the whole region. The business community plays a crucial role in providing the conditions for peace, through job creation and economic security. The coastal capital, Beirut, acts as a focus for the nation's tourism, banking, commerce and agricultural sectors. Can it also be a center for "a moral capitalism?" Is a thriving, moral capitalism possible at a time when the Lebanese economy is stalled? This was the question posed by a two-day conference hosted by Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) between March 8 and 9, 2017.

The aim was to promote best practices among business leaders and entrepreneurs, and to encourage Lebanon's participation in the UN Global Compact. It also aimed to revive the Swiss-based Caux Round Table (CRT) group of business executives in Lebanon, represented at the conference by Minnesota-based businessman Robert MacGregor. Some 80 business students and a similar number of media students took part at the conference alongside the business men and women, bankers, journalists, and broadcasters.



Dean of the Faculty of Humanities at NDU Dr. Kamal Abouchedid and Chairholder of the Benedict XVI Endowed Chair of Religious, Cultural and Philosophical Studies at NDU Dr. Edward Alam welcomed the international participants. The NDU Faculty of Business Administration and Economics (FBAE), in collaboration with MA'AM (the Islamic-Christian Forum for Businessmen), and Initiatives of Change (IofC) co-hosted the event. Dr. Alam, FBAE Dean Yussef Zgheib, NDU Business Administration and Economics lecturer Omar Sakr, and NDU Associate Professor of Political Science Eugenee Sensenig organized and facilitated the entire conference.

Antoine Frem, chairman of Indevco Management Resources, part of an international industrial conglomerate, said in his opening remarks, "Business needs a moral compass ... It is better for you to fail with honor than to succeed with fraud." Corruption, rife in political and business circles, needed to be eliminated, he urged. "We need a Davos of values," he said, referring to the World Economic Forum that meets in Davos, Switzerland, each year. NDU Faculty of Engineering (FE) Assistant Professor Sofia Ghanimeh saw climate change as "the most pressing issue the world faces," while Area General Manager of Phoenix, a member company of the Indevco group, Rabih Osta emphasized the progress that Lebanon was making toward renewable energy resources by 2020. The company had acquired solar water heaters from The



A panel of women entrepreneurs, moderated by TV presenter and renowned business specialist Dr. Hasan Younes, marked International Women's Day on March 8. They included Founder and Managing Partner at Netways Roula Moussa, listed in 2014 by Forbes magazine among "the 200 most powerful women in the Arab world." Tania Moussallem of BLC bank, who is also Chair of the Global Banking Alliance for Women, developing strategies for women's economic empowerment across the world, joined her.



Netherlands and Lebanon aimed to reduce landfill to below 10 percent of waste through recycling. He said the need was for a "servant leadership."

Head of Business Programs at IoC in the U.K. Michael Smith spoke about the 10 years of annual conferences on "Trust and Integrity in the Global Economy (TIGE)" held at the IoC center in Caux, Switzerland. In answer to the question, "Is moral capitalism possible?" posed by the Beirut conference, he said, "Yes, provided we are true to our conscience and our consciousness about what needs to change in the world." Unexpected political outcomes, such as the vote for Brexit in the U.K. and the election of Donald Trump as the U.S. President, had been due to the reaction of alienated populations against venal economic and political elites. Smith cites Adam Smith's moral philosophy, which urged a sense of conscience and mutual interest, and not just the "invisible hand of the market" for which the Scottish economist is most remembered.



A media panel, hosted by NDU Media Studies lecturer Rouba el-Helou, stressed the need for ethical conduct in the media, at a time of low circulations due to competition from online and social media. They included Publisher and Editor-in-chief of the business monthly magazine Executive Yasser Akkaoui and Chair and Managing Partner at publishers Planet News Business Hala Bejjani. MacGregor explained that his Minnesota Principles for business, written when he was President of the Center for Ethical Business Cultures affiliated to the University of St. Thomas School of Business, had been the basis for the CRT's Principles for Business. This work had been published in the 1990s by European, American, and Japanese business leaders. Chair of the Contemporary Middle East Studies at the University of Southern Denmark Professor Martin Beck suggested that the CRT's Principles might today acknowledge the world's refugees who are too often paid minimum wages.

A discussion group, led by Frem, decided to relaunch the CRT in Lebanon, in partnership with Indevco and NDU. This endeavor will contribute toward Lebanon becoming a catalyst for peace in the whole region.





First Prize in National Public Speaking Contest

Competing in the various categories were middle and high school students, university students, and Syrian students (refugees).

Chairperson of the Department of Mechanical Engineering Dr. Najib Metni delivered the welcome note in which he thanked all those who helped and contributed toward making the event a success. For his part, FE Dean Dr. Michel Hayek highlighted the significance of the event in general and noted its significance for the Faculty in particular. He said that this year's VRC had taken on a new dimension with the inclusion of a category for Syrian refugee students. VRC President Omar Hussein stressed the main objective of the competition, which is to train students on how to better plan and create.



The representative of Media Association for Peace (MAP), an association set up for Syrian refugees, Fadi Halabi noted importance of this event, especially with the addition of the "ROBOGEE" category for Syrian refugee students.

Winners received an amount of US\$3,000 in addition to the much sought-after qualification to participate in the international competition, which will take place in the United States of America.

Unveiling of Statue to Commemorate Habib Salame

Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) unveiled on Thursday, April 20, 2017, a life-size statue sculpted by renowned Lebanese artist Pierre Karam at its main campus to commemorate Habib Salame, the architect who designed NDU.



A ceremony, held in Issam Fares Hall, preceded the unveiling of the statue. Director of the Office of Public Affairs and Events at NDU Dr. Nada Saad Saber in her welcome address greeted the guests, who included Bishop François Eid, representing Patriarch Cardinal Mar Bechara Boutros al-Rahi, Apostolic Nuncio to Lebanon Archbishop Gabrielle Cassia, and religious, political, social, and military figures.

In his speech, NDU President Fr. Walid Moussa said, "Death is unjust and cruel is the absence, but his art shall not die; though the body is absent, his creations live on. Habib Salame was an artist; many are engineers and architects, but few are artists."

For his part, Bishop Eid discussed Salame's wonderful engineering exploits and the gifts of creativity that God had given him to build astounding churches, Church institutions, and a host of other institutions that serve society.





Salame's son, Fadi, was the final speaker. Fadi thanked everyone who had contributed to the success of the commemoration, and added, "If you really want to appreciate Habib Salame's work, it's enough to be here at NDU where you can see first-hand how his vision became a reality."

A documentary produced by Rudy Hachache was screened during the ceremony, and Salame's daughter, Samar, a soprano, performed a beautiful version of Ave Maria.

Shortly thereafter, the statue was unveiled.


