<u>First</u>, I am very happy and I feel very much encouraged by your presence. Your presence here tonight is a real encouragement for us to go on with our mission in Lebanon. It makes me more convinced that you believe in what we at NDU are doing. Your support for our efforts is very significant to us and it really makes a difference. We, at NDU, definitely count on it.

Notre Dame University-Louaize is currently celebrating its 20th anniversary (1987-2007). With the spirit of openness, NDU strives to graduate well-formed students that are successful decision-makers. It instills in them core ethical values and the belief in dialogue, forgiveness and justice. Our success in this endeavor is partly

In 20 years, NDU has become one of the largest universities in Lebanon. Seven Colleges with more than 5,000 students enrolled at undergraduate and graduate levels, and 550 faculty members together with 300 staff members being at their service. The number of the alumni has crossed over the 10,000. Impressive three campuses, with a large housing complex at the Main Campus including 450 beds for both male and female students as well as faculty members, this was inaugurated beginning this fall.

However, the dire economic situation in Lebanon has caused a large number of our students to suffer from financial hardship. In spite of its limited resources, NDU has never wavered to respond to the needs of its students. It has significantly increased its financial assistance in order to ease their financial burden. A prolonged and expanded financial assistance program by the university will ultimately hamper its growth and adversely affect its future goals. Therefore, we are seeking the financial support of our alumni, American friends, and the Lebanese communities in North America to provide scholarships for our needy students. Thus, supporting the University to expand its programs, develop new laboratories in emerging technologies and upgrade existing laboratories.

Moreover, NDU can serve its American friends and the Lebanese communities through its student exchange program and the Arabic

summer program. It provides a perfect setting for living the Lebanese cultural experience at the college level.
