Humanities **Symposium**

The Council for Research in Values and Philosophy (CRVP) at Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) organized the Fetzer Advisory Council on the Humanities Symposium 2013 titled "Intercultural/Interreligious Dialogue: Reflections on the Nature of Love and Forgiveness" in which 13 international scholars from Belgium, China, the U.S.A., and Lebanon participated with four participants presenting academic papers on different sub-themes such as:

- Love &Forgiveness in the Sunni Islamic Tradition: An Overview
- The Tender Heart and the Kingdom of God: On Christian Love and Forgiveness
- The Culture of Co-existence in Buddhism & What is Love?
- A Reading in Foundational Shi'ite Literature.

The rich diversity of participants made for an extremely valuable symposium with Dr. Nader el-Bizri, explaining the Sunni perspective and Sheikh Shafiq Jaradi explaining the Shi'ite perspective. Dr. Jeffrey Bloechl presented a profound Catholic perspective and Venerable Dr. Yifa, a Buddhist nun, presented a fascinating eastern perspective.

Alongside academic papers and fruitful open discussions, the program included powerful personal testimonies, book reviews, and film commentaries by Alexandra Asseily, Assaad Chaftari, and Ramez Salameh; subjects, which transcended forgiveness. Cultural-based excursions enriched the program by elevating the value and power of love and forgiveness from theory into practice and living.

The Jeita Grotto, the OMM Monastery, and the museum tour, lunch with the Maronite Mariamite priests and brothers attending the lectures served to give this Symposium a wonderful fraternal aura. The speakers were treated to visits to St. Anthony of the Desert, Kozhaya, the Patriarchal Residence and Gardens, Diman, Gibran Khalil Gibran Museum, the Cedar Grove, the Holy Valleys of Qadisha and Qannoubine, Baalbek, Anjar, Ksara (wine-tasting), and Sidon, which offered them a splendid and very Lebanese experience.







Commemorating Charles Malek



On the occasion of the International Day of Human Rights, Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) on Tuesday, December 10, 2013, unveiled a bust at the NDU Main Campus to commemorate the role of Dr. Charles Malek in helping to draft with Eleanor Roosevelt the Universal Declaration of Human Rights at the United Nations in December, 1948.

A ceremony was held at the NDU Auditorium before the unveiling of the bust. Mrs. Layal Nehme, NDU Placement Officer, welcomed the attendees, who included Bishop Boulos Rouhana, representing the Patriarch Cardinal Mar Bechara Boutros al-Rahi, Ambassador to the Holy

See Monsignor Gabriel Caccia, as well as religious, political, social, and military figures.

In his speech, the Vice-President for Cultural Affairs and Public Relations Mr. Souheil Mattar took the audience on a trip down memory lane to 1980 when Charles Malek visited NDU (LCHE at the time). Mr. Mattar recounted what Malek told him during the visit, "Do not hesitate in creating a university, because the Virgin Mary deserves to have a university built in her name, and the region deserves to have an American liberal arts institution of higher learning."

Fr. Walid Moussa, President of NDU, then took the podium. He reflected on the darkness looming over humanity in the modern era, and noted how estranged from Human Rights the world has become.

Fr. Moussa continued, "Through the passage of time, humanity has collapsed ... that is why we find ourselves living in a world where killing, violence, blood, and suicide have become the norm. Is this the result of science and globalization? Is this the result of chemicals, nuclear energy, wars, viruses, pollution ... How many crimes have been committed against humanity and how many communities have been displaced, fleeing from the fires of hatred, racism, and brutality?"

Fr. Moussa went on to confirm the Faith of the University, saying, "Human rights are, and will remain, the foundation to respect the bodies and souls of human beings."

Mr. Antoine Akl, the next speaker after Fr. Moussa, recounted what Malik had told him of his experiences during the drafting the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and Akl reminisced how Malek was frustrated by the deception and continuing violations of the objectives of the Declaration.

Charles Malek's son, Habib Malik, was the final speaker. He talked about the letters that were exchanged between his father and his friends, which showed Malek's desire to return to Beirut and to return to higher education and to teaching philosophy. His father viewed his work at the United Nations as "a transitional phase in order to serve Lebanon in the diplomatic arena."

In conclusion, Habib congratulated the University for its initiative in honoring his father. The bust of Charles Malek was unveiled on the grounds of the Main Campus shortly thereafter in the presence of the entire audience.
