Following her selection to participate in the Civic Education and Leadership Fellowship (CELF) at the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs of Syracuse University, New York, USA, Ms. Hourani returned to resume her duties as the Director of LERC.

Ms. Hourani was delighted to have participated in the program which is part of the Middle East Partnership Initiative (MEPI) program of the State Department. The aim of the program is for the participants "to promote civic engagement in their home countries via improved pedagogy, teacher preparation, and curriculum development for related social science departments."

In describing her experience with the program, Ms. Hourani stated that "the program provided us with the opportunity to discuss pedagogical, methodological, and curriculum development issues related to our countries, universities, and faculties. It gave us the chance to learn from veteran professors about what has been coined as 'active learning', which is a pedagogical methodology aiming at combining instruction with practice." Syracuse University has developed a model built around four principles: "client-centered work in natural settings, task design that is attentive to the motivational properties of the active learning stimulus, learning as social participation, and community service learning."
