By making PMI membership accessible to our students, we have not only given them an edge in the job market but also provided them with essential access to valuable knowledge, networks, and resources.

To put things into perspective, accreditation was earned through dedicated effort, quality education,

and the ability to provide students with innovative learning at every turn to ensure they enjoy and benefit from an exceptional educational experience. In short, innovative learning is the leading strategy at the FBAE where students are encouraged to excel and provided with all the support they need to explore new horizons and successfully participate in enriching real-world experiences.



What's your name?

My name is Christy Haddad. I am a NDU Alumni and a CFA Level II Candidate for June 2018.

Major/When did you graduate?

From civil engineering to architecture to finally settling in Business Administration, I decided to pursue my education in Finance because I wasn't sure that this is what I wanted. I didn't know anything about Management, Accounting, Economics or Finance. I didn't have an orientation session or guidance to help me decide what major I would pursue at university. I was lost, just like a big number of high school graduates nowadays.

What did you gain from FBAE and the department?

One thing that the Faculty of Business helped me with is to expose me to different fields in the business world. I hate routine, I hate repeating the same thing over and over again. FBAE taught me different things at once and how to link them together without focusing on one thing only. I am a person who easily gets bored from one subject and the fact that I was able to understand and relate, for example, marketing and economics (demand and supply, consumers' tastes and savings) or management and finance (Industry analysis, company valuation) helped me gain an insight into the real world and not only in books.

Best course? Why?

Many of my friends who graduated with me knew all about my passion for Finance. I knew I loved numbers, but I also loved cars. I knew I loved mechanical engineering, but I also loved management. However, Finance I was too theoretical. BAF321- Investments and BAF453-Financial Modeling were the best courses I have ever taken because they reflected the real life. I learned how trades are made, how to invest in stocks, how to value a company...It gave me an insight into the real investment world and how to efficiently invest my money. Financial modeling, however, took all the contents of Investments and put them to practice. We got to a deeper level where I had to analyze and value global companies, as well as learn how to build optimal portfolios (which most of us

have (and might not know), with our insurance or retirement pension plans.

Best lecturer? Why?

Nohade Nasrallah. I wouldn't be in the Finance field now in BNP Paribas Headquarters, #1 bank in Europe and #5 worldwide. She is the one that pushed me to work hard towards reaching the CFA designation and she was there for me anytime I needed her, whether it was at 7 a.m. or 7 p.m. She believed in me and she saw great potential in me. I still keep contact with her and she is my source of reference for every job I get.

Where do you see yourself in five years?

No one knows where we are heading. Things are moving at a fast pace. 2 years and a half ago, I was wearing my cap and gown with nowhere to go. I worked in an investment bank in Lebanon, and then moved to Canada to work in Canada's #1 Bank and now in BNP Paribas as an Anti-Money Laundering and Counter Terrorist Financing Analyst in the Compliance Department. Who knows, maybe in 1 year I will be in Wall Street, London or ... back to Lebanon with my CFA designation and still be searching for a job...

Advice for lecturers?

Nothing is more boring than doing by the book. Life is bigger than that. Incorporating some practice into the courses will be more motivating and will induce a higher passing rate because it builds interest for students. When I graduated, I was so glad to be done with reading and passing tests and wanted to discover what the workplace really looked like. I was a stranger, I wasn't prepared, and everything was different. Why do we spend 3-4 years on average studying for something that we won't use at work. I guess preparing students for the workplace (in terms of skills so that they can make useful information out of any data) in class would help a lot and would make it easier and more interactive for lecturers to teach. That would ameliorate the lack of participation in class.

How did NDU help you get your current position?

We know in Lebanon that brands are everything: AUB, LAU, USEK, USJ. The step that NDU has taken to get its accreditation helped the university build some level of credibility on an international scale. Many universities in the world are now knowledgeable of the NDU program. NDU was accredited with Concordia University in Montreal, which helped me get the equivalent of my Bachelor and Minor here without having to take some extra credits due to the difference in programs. I immediately entered the workplace without having to get back into university to compensate for some courses.

A piece of advice for current students

Time flies. I am not going to advise you to study hard. I will not advise you to have fun. Time management is the best skill you can manage to have. Everything will follow. When you master time management, you are able to

do everything in life. You can manage your university life with your social life and your job easily. When you organize your life, you can achieve more than you think without needing overtime. I graduated with a 3.68 GPA, currently studying for the CFA exam, having 1 full-time job, 1 part-time job, 3 basketball practices per week, 2 days for the gym and of course the weekend to party. Nothing is impossible; you just have to manage your time wisely to achieve your goals in the best possible

Now that you are in the market, what would you recommend for a better department?

Guide students, provide help for their courses, revision sessions before exams... When we are overwhelmed with many exams at once, sometimes a small recap or revision takes a big load off our shoulders and makes us relaxed. One of the most recurrent reasons for poor performance is stress, stress from not covering all the testable material and stress because half of it looks Chinese to us.

Where do you see yourself in five years?



What did you gain from FBAE?

Going into FBAE, I honestly did not expect to learn as much as I did. I thought it would be simply going into a classroom, pretending to focus in class, memorizing at home, and just passing the course. I couldn't be more wrong.

From tough professors who turned out to be the most supportive mentors to sleepless nights on projects that helped do me extensive practical work; every class taught me something. FBAE forced me into 4 years of studying, teamwork, self-reliance, and most importantly, ethics. It wasn't just about listening to our professors explaining the chapters, but it was witnessing them apply it to their everyday encounters.

I couldn't be more grateful for these 4 tough yet truly beneficial years of my life.

Best course? Why?

Personally, I guess there is no such thing as a "best course" because being at this level, a student needs to collect any type of information from different courses owing to the fact that linking all these 'data' together will help him better understand how real life works. Therefore, the course that was able to merge and combine approximately everything I have learned during my time at university was the E-business (BAD 453) course.

E-business wasn't conducted in a classic manner. It wasn't about theories anymore. Students were given a simulation in which they are responsible of managing every department in a company such as finance, marketing, HR, sales, forecasting, R&D...

Imagine the amount of knowledge needed to be able to conduct such simulation! In addition, students are facing a real case scenario where the success or failure of the company is in their hands. In a way or another, this puts students under pressure because for me this was the real test if whether I was able to grab the needed information from the past 2 years and if I was ready to use them efficiently when I will leave university and face real challenges. This course was the closest test to reality and it can really show if a student is well prepared or not.

Best lecturer? Why?

Give me a fish; I'll eat for a day. Teach me to fish and I will eat for a lifetime.

Rarely can we find teachers that are willing to transfer their know-how to their students. I was lucky enough to be mentored by amazing, down to earth and compassionate teachers throughout my university years. I had the opportunity to learn from their experiences that shaped somehow, my thinking and my perception of life. I cannot neglect that everyone had an impact over my life; but there is always that one person that can influence your thoughts no matter what.

Mr. Salim Karam was one of those people that were able to leave their footprints and shape a student's way of thinking. Despite being old school, Mr. Karam is such a motivational speaker, a teacher that sees the potential and capabilities in his students and pushes them forward to accomplish and fulfill their dreams, he has the ability to awaken joy in creative expression and knowledge. The fact that he teaches from his heart through sharing his past experiences and focusing on us learning from them, inspires us to be better persons. 
Fill in the blank: If you really knew me, you'd know

How financial innovation can boost economy April 30, 2018



The Department of Accounting and Finance (DAF) in the Faculty of Business Administration and Economics (FBAE) at Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) organized on April 19, 2018, a lecture titled, "How Financial Innovation Can Boost Economy," presented by Dr. Riad B. Obegi.

Dr. Obegi presented his innovative banking instrument: the Certificat Hypothécaire Obegi (CHO).

The CHO is the topic of Dr. Obegi's Ph.D. thesis titled, "Risque et Crédit: Le Certificat Hypothécaire, Une Solution pour Les Pays Emergents," which is currently in its second printing.

It is a banking instrument in the form of a real-estate guarantee certificate (CHO), which is deposited into a bank. It works just like depositing cash into a bank account, but instead of receiving interest on cash, a fee is earned on a CHO. This guarantee will be used by the bank to borrow more efficiently through the interbank market while using the CHO as collateral.

An independent agency will conduct the necessary due diligence on the properties, evaluate them, and issue standard values against a fee paid by the depositary banks. The independent agency is a key component for the proper functioning of the mechanism. In addition, it will provide all stakeholders (real-estate owners, state, banks, etc.) valuable information that is presently disseminated.

This banking innovation will allow real-estate owners to increase their income, better manage their real- estate assets, and contribute to the economic growth of



their countries. Dr. Obegi believes that this real estate "bankarization" can play an important role in boosting economic growth and improving the standard of living in emerging countries. He estimates that the total real estate value in developing countries is close to 20X GDP.

This innovation has the potential for all developing countries. Efforts have already been made in the Middle East, Africa, and South America; meetings were conducted with various official authorities, regulators, and international institutions, such as the World Bank, the IFC, and the Central Bank of West African States (BCEAO) to introduce the concept of CHO.

In the presence of NDU President Fr. Pierre Najem, VP for Administration Fr. Samir Ghsoub, faculty, students, and guests, FBAE Chairperson Dr. Vivane Naimy hosted the participating students on December 11, 2017. She quoted a famous saying, "Often people that settle in life are those that only do what they can with what they have and where they are. The role of central banks in countries 'economies: the case of Banque du Liban February 16, 2018



The Department of Accounting and Finance (DAF) in the Faculty of Business Administration and Economics (FBAE) at Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) organized on Febraury 16, 2018, a lecture titled, "the role of Central Banks in countries'economies: the case of Banque Du Liban," presented by Dr. Raed H. charafeddine, first Vice-Governor at Banque Du Liban.

The conference stressed on the role of the Banque Du Liban to ensure the basis for comprehensive, sustainable, and independent social development and sustainable economic growth through achieving its conventional objectives of sustaining monetary stability through maintaining the exchange rate level and a high level of foreign reserves that has recorded US \$43.5 billion in October 2017, excluding gold reserves that rank the second on the Arab level and eighteenth globally. BDL has also pursued interest rate stability without disrupting market mechanisms, hence securing effective sources of financing for private and public sectors and enhancing financial inclusion, which reaches 47% in Lebanon, compared to n18% in the Arab world.

The hard economic conditions have compelled BDL to implement unconventional monetary policies and financial engineering tools. These tools serve to stimulate demand and support the government in creating the necessary conditions for sustainable growth through boosting lending activity and fueling economic growth to revitalize the labor market, thus reinforcing social and environmental security, and promoting human development. These packages, extending from 2013 through 2017 and amounting to an average of US\$1 billion per year, proved to be successful by contributing around 50% to real GDP growth. These includes incentives to support housing, education, renewable energy projects, innovative projects, research and development ventures, entrepreneurship, exporting industries, art-production projects, and other productive sectors of the economy.

NEWS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS

New Lebanese taxes and their economic and financial impact October 30, 2017



The main objectives of this presentation were to highlight the economic and financial impact of the new taxes adopted by the Lebanese government on household's consumption and saving. The speaker discussed their impact on the public budget and how they would affect investment and economic growth. The speaker discussed some other alternatives missed by the Government.

Speaker: Dr. Hassan Hamadi, Associate Professor of Finance at Notre Dame University, Louaize.

Bitcoin: How, Why and Who? November 29, 2017



This presentation discussed how Bitcoin was created, who created it and for which purpose. The speaker explained how Bitcoin works and the value of its worth. He analyzed the risks of investing in Bitcoin. He also discussed the possibility that one day the monetary system depends on digital currencies.

Speaker: Dr. Seifdean Ammous, Assistant Professor of Economics at the Lebanese American University.

Economic Development through Bureaucratic Corruption: The Lebanese CaseNovember 14, 2017

The effect of corruption is regime specific and countries sort themselves into different growth-corruption regimes, conditional on the quality of their political institutions. In particular, in countries with good governance, the effect of corruption on growth is negative, while in countries with poor governance, the effect is positive (or less negative). The speaker analyzed the below points in the context of the Lebanese confessional political system

- > The marginal effect of corruption is conditional on the institutional environment. In particular, the marginal effect of corruption on growth is positive in countries with deficient political institutions or policies and negative elsewhere
- > There exists a growth maximizing level of corruption. In particular, at low levels of corruption the beneficial effects of corruption dominate the detrimental effects and vice versa



SHE POWERS..."International Women's Day 2018



Notre Dame University- Louaize (NDU) celebrated on March 5, 2018, at its main campus, a daylong International Women's Day conference themed, "She Powers...", held under the patronage and in the presence of Lebanese Minister for Women's Affairs H.E. Jean Oghassabian and Lebanese Minister of State for Administrative Reform H.E. Dr. Inaya Ezzeddine. Also in attendance were Deputy Head of Delegation of the European Union Mission in Lebanon Julia Koch de Biolley; Executive Board Member of the National Commission for Lebanese Women Martine Najem Kteily; President of the Lebanese League for Women in Business Asmahan Zein; invited guests; media representatives; and a number of University faculty, staff, and students.

The conference was organized in the framework of bolstering the University strategy to strengthen the role of women in decision-making and to motivate them to develop their skills. Apart from being firmly committed to empowering women and to fully supporting the UN 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG), including SDG#5 and SDG#10, the University is proud to state that 50 percent of its faculty and staff, 66 percent of its chairpersons, and 40 percent of its students are women.

NDU President Fr. Pierre Najem delivered the welcome address, expounding on the University strategy to improve the representation and role of every woman across the three campuses with regard to encouraging gender equality and establishing platforms for the increased participation of women in both the administrative and Faculty decision-making process.

For his part, Oghassabian said, "the various women's forum comprised of a host of influential speakers in science, business, politics, and public service. The "Women in Politics Panel" was presided by Lebanese TV presenter and producer Dalia Dagher, Secretary-General of the Lebanese Forces (LF) Party Dr. Chantal Sarkis, and Deputy General Manager of An-Nahar newspaper Michelle Tueni.

Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Engineering (FE) at NDU Dr. Sophia Ghanimeh moderated the "Women in Science Panel" with the participation of Director of the Parliamentary Capacity Development Portfolio at the Natural Resource Governance Institute (NRGI) in the MENA Laury Haytayan. This panel focused on Arab parliamentarians' legislative and oversight roles in advancing reforms in the Middle East's Oil and Gas sector.

Legal Counsel at NDU Asma el-Khazen represented the University in the "Women in Public Sector Panel" with the participation of Lebanese Armed Forces (LAF) representative General Dr. Rima Abou Hamad, Internal Security Forces (ISF) Captain Sylva Salameh, and Lebanese General Security Captain Rana Asfour.

The final panel emphasized the "Role of Women in Business" with Chairperson of the Department of Management and Marketing at NDU Dr. Jennifer Abou Hamad, Founder and CEO of Ounousa.com Elsa Aoun. and NDU alumna and Boecker International Country Manager in Qatar Carla Ghaleb Tarraf.

Team NDU Wins the KPMG Lebanon Case Competition



The Department of Management and Marketing (DMM) at the Faculty of Business and Administration (FBAE). Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU), participated from October 9 till October 11, 2017, in Le Gray Hotel, Beirut, in a two-day KPMG-sponsored workshop/competition titled, "Ace the Case," and won the KPMG Lebanon case competition.

This workshop helped the NDU "Aces of Strategy" team (composed of Danielle Abou Fayad, Elie Chahda, Joanne el-Khoury, Fayez Haddadin, and Charbel Daghfal) to develop their analytical, case writing, and presentation skills through a networking session. All contestants from different Lebanese universities got acquainted with each other as well as with the KPMG staff during a cocktail, which included interactive activities. Following a training session, the NDU team introduced the KPMG 7-step process for case analysis and presentation training.

On competition day, the NDU team was placed in an advisory role within an international services firm

interested in helping AMORIM, a fourth-generation familyrun business and the world's largest manufacturers of cork-based products, to use data and analytics to improve its strategic development process. More specifically, the team was charged with making recommendations about current and future markets and product offerings through the creation of a strategic plan that emphasized innovation and cost-effectiveness.

To solve the case, students needed to identify opportunities and threats, leading to the identification of the main strategic issues. "We were required to provide solutions in the immediate short-run, the short-run, the medium-run, and the long-run," said the team's spokesperson. "All solutions proposed were backed by both qualitative and quantitative analysis proof to ensure rationality, legal and social validity, and increased profitability and operational efficiency."

The spokesperson added, "One of the solutions was utilizing the concept of green marketing through recycling. We encouraged wine producers to use DDP shipping as a way to convince customers to exchange used crocks for wine bottles; hence, lowering production costs (improved profit margin), giving trees more time to re-generate bark, and appearing socially responsible (also fulfilling the need for succession planning since it is a family-run business)."

NDU's "Aces of Strategy" team traveled to Malaysia in April 2018 to participate in a global competition and experience the opportunity of a lifetime.

The team represented NDU in international competitions and after the competition four students received an internship at KPMG in different countries.

LAU Case Study Competition



The Lebanese American University (LAU) organized a case study competition on Saturday April 21, 2018 and Sunday April 22, 2018. The students Charbel Daghfal (Business Management), Sara Daghfal (Banking & Finance), Caren Mghames (Marketing), and Ghiwa Dagher (Business

Management) participated from NDU.

Forty- two teams participated in the competition where four companies presented their problem/project in a twenty to thirty minutes briefing then every team had three hours to find a proper solution for each case. The companies were Leo Burnett, Cisco, Ernst & Young, and Careem.

Each company chose three to eight finalists to present their solutions and then the top three teams were chosen. The top three teams from each case won internships at the respective companies.

The NDU team was among the top three finalists in the Cisco case and the top five finalists in the Leo Brunett case. NDU students won internships at the respective companies and all team members got a certificate of participation at the end of the competition.

OPEN SPACE = OPEN STRESS?



The Department of Management and Marketing (DMM) and the Department of Hospitality and Tourism Management (DHTM) in the Faculty of Business

Administration and Economics (FBAE) at Notre Dame University-Louaize (NDU) organized on April 20, 2017, its annual CSR-HR conference titled, "Open Space = Open Stress?"

Attending the conference were: CEO of NS&A Nagi Sfeir, Group Vice-President Operations at Transmed Group Maroun Merhi, CEO of SKYNET Mourad Aoun, Planning and Project Management Advisor at Bank Audi Rami Nassar, in the presence of deans, faculty, staff, and students. DMM Chairperson at NDU Dr. Jennifer Abou Hamad moderated the conference, which aimed to engage students in the fields of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) and Human Resources (HR) and DHTM faculty member Omar Sakr was the master of ceremony.

Some may think that an open space workplace symbolizes modernity and transparency at work; however, it could be a perpetual nightmare. Proponents of open space put forward the following advantages: space saving, better communication among employees and teams, better monitoring of company activities, and mutual supervision. On the other hand, opponents of open space put forward the following disadvantages: noisy, lacking in privacy, forcing employees to succumb to nosy colleagues, and negatively affecting productivity.

Dean of FBAE Dr. Fadi Karaa welcomed all the attendees and gave a small overview of the conference.

For his part, Sfeir explained open space architecture, which has evolved dramatically over the decades. The benefits of an architecturally appealing office space to create an overall good vibe far outweigh the initial costs. Employees are spending less and less time at the office, so there is a need to provide them with a place they want to be – a place they enjoy being in. He said, "Open space allows for better communication and for increased performance."

Merhi discussed the reasons behind why companies need an open space work environment. The improved communication that results from a lack of physical barriers enable employees to collaborate freelybounce ideas off of each other and ask for assistance, as needs arise. The fluid communication enables them to establish relationships with their colleagues and create an atmosphere of greater teamwork, fulfillment, and happiness. From a managing perspective, he said, "Management has to be involved in the main elements of office designs."

Aoun talked about the evolution of SKYNET and its current open space architecture throughout its offices; in addition to the greenery, which gives employees positive vibes and a feeling of joy when they are in the workplace. He said, "Our core mission focuses on care, clarity, legacy, and social accountability."

Finally, Nassar focused on the primary purpose of an office building, which must be designed to facilitate a

workplace and environment that fosters information and knowledge processing activities, such as filing, planning, designing, supervising, analyzing, deciding, and communicating. He added, "Factors influencing office workplace planning and design are functional, technical, and financial factors."

Field trip to INDEVCO headquarters



Dr. Mariam Shebaya planned for her HRM453 students at NDU-NLC a field trip to INDEVCO headquarters (Human Resources & Organization Development Department) and plant tours of Sanita and Masterpak (Zouk Complex) on November 15, 2017.

The objective of the trip was to take the students out of the classroom and give them a glimpse of the real world of organizations (and specifically HR professionals within organizations). While the subject matter is mostly theoretical with examples from real industries and companies, it would be helpful for students to interact with real HR professionals on the field and ask them about the practical application of what they have learnt in class.

INDEVCO's V.P. of HROD Department (Mr. Wissam Moubarak) and Head of Recruitment (Mr. Fadi Younes) gave the students an extremely warm welcome (along with cakes, cookies, and juice. That already put them at ease from the beginning. Mr. Moubarak and Mr. Younes then gave them a presentation introducing them to the company, its divisions, where it is spread, the industries it represents, and a lot more info on their group of companies and products, as well as on their organizational culture, philosophy, and values. They focused on their global expansion and export strategies, mainly information that is relevant to global strategies. They then moved on to a thorough description of their HROD department and its operations, focusing on areas relevant to global HR management. They also shared with them some of the challenges they face at the global HR level, from recruitment to compensation to culture and values, and various other topics. The floor was then opened for questions & answers. Students' questions were very relevant and pertinent, even surprising the speakers at times. They really made a good impression. After that, Dr. Gebran Karnaouni (head of Safety...) gave them a very interesting presentation highlighting the importance of safety in the workplace, outlining their

work towards acquiring the UK Safety accreditation, and leading them through a discussion about safety in the workplace, working towards making factories as close to accident-free as possible. This was important before the plant tour, but also served to raise students' awareness of these very real issues in the workplace.

Students then got a highly interesting tour inside their Sanita factories (they saw the process of hygienic pad production through to packaging, flexible packaging, agricultural products, etc...) and Masterpak (students saw the process of hygienic pad production through to packaging, flexible packaging, agricultural products, labs, etc...). Although one could question the value of a plant tour for HR students, it did serve the purpose of highlighting the fact that HR professionals cannot stay behind their desks and come up with policies, but should be as close to people and be able to see, hear, and feel their working conditions before taking certain actions, a fact that was highlighted in the presentation by Mr. Wissam and Mr. Fadi. During the plant tours they met heads of operations, safety and security managers, and workers on the factory floor. Students even got to see a machine glitch being dealt with on the spot! All that while seeing how tough factory conditions can be with their own eyes (and ears too as the level of noise was overbearing).

Students expressed a lot of appreciation for this opportunity to be exposed to a real organization. They expressed their appreciation of their openness to share their challenges. They loved their philosophy and people approach, as well as their guiding values.

The visit was concluded with a parting gift and their recruitment brochure, as well as encouragement from Mr. Fadi for them to go to the job fair at NDU Main Campus and submit their CVs in case they are interested.

The Economic Forum on "The Role of Local Employment in Stimulating the Rural Economy" on Monday, March 19, 2018



The Faculty of Business Administration and Economics (FBAE) at NDU-Shouf Campus organized an economic forum with the presence of two distinguished guest speakers: Former Minister of Economy and Trade Dr. Alain Hakim and the President of the General Confederation of Lebanese Workers Dr. Bechara Asmar, entitled "The Role of Local Employment in stimulating the Rural Economy" on Monday, March 19, 2018. The event was moderated by the Director of the Office of Public Affairs and Protocol at NDU the Journalist Mr. Majed Bou Hadir with the presence of heads of municipalities, bank managers, schools' Principals and a number of university professors, students and staff.

The symposium was initiated by a welcoming speech from the Director of the NDU-Shouf Campus Father Naji Khalil who sincerely welcomed the guest speakers and the attendees. Father Khalil emphasized on the

importance of the tackled topic and the need for greater attention to rural development. He said that "We are not here not to promote modern job opportunities available in the 21st century and return to the tradition ... but we must avoid the negligence of the bounties of the agriculture and handicraft industries, and create a kind of balance between agriculture, industry and trade." At the end of his speech, Father Khalil encouraged on organizing additional seminars on the development of the rural economy. He also introduced the guest speakers and their outstanding achievements. In his speach, Dr. Kassamany also stressed on the role that the public and private sectors can play in activating rural employment through supporting small and medium-sized rural enterprises and employing qualified rural young men and women.

After the welcoming words, the journalist Majed Bou Hadir started his introduction with a brief overview of the impact of the Lebanese economic situation on reducing qualified workers on rural areas and hence weakening their economies. In addition, Mr. Bou Hadir introduces the guest speakers by presenting their achievements.

At the beginning of the discussion, the Former Minister Dr. Alain Hakim reviewed the current economic situation in Lebanon by highlighting the shortcomings of the policies adopted by successive governments through focusing on three of them. First, Lebanon has for many years pursued daily monetary policies that provide only temporary and immediate solutions to the chronic problems of its economy. Second, the economy is based on the financial and banking sector, as well as on individual initiatives and private sector remittances, rather than developing the more productive sectors such as agriculture and industry, which can stimulate growth in cities and rural areas and provide economic safety. In this context. Dr. Hakim revealed that there is a decline in foreign direct investment, which recorded 36% in 2016. Third, the absence of economic planning and the lack of clear economic strategies covering all regions.

In addition, Dr. Hakim stressed on the need to place rural development on the socio-economic priorities of the Lebanese government. Any serious efforts for sustainable development necessitate consideration and solutions to the problems of rural areas. He stated number of policies that can be adopted to stimulate the economy in these areas, notably the activation of the role of women in economic activity, the development of infrastructure in these areas, and the support of cooperatives and civil societies in them. He also emphasized on the need to guide students to the university majors demanded by the labor market in different areas.

As for Dr. Bechara Asmar, he started his discussion by reviewing the changes witnessed the general labor union

and the current role it plays at different levels, especially with regard to the remarks on the draft governmental budget and the proposed tax exemptions. Dr Asmer also criticized the policies of importing solutions from abroad instead of benefiting from the qualifications of internal economists. He stressed on the need to strengthen the districts and governorates through the establishment of branches of the official departments and the Central Bank to facilitate the work in them. Dr. Asmar also emphasized on the importance of the development of transportation plans linking the rural areas to the capital, and the adoption of the decentralization model of factories and vital facilities, as well as the support of small and medium enterprises in the countryside, to achieve balanced growth among all regions and relieve the pressure on the capital. He pointed out some problems that drain the Lebanese economy and burden the citizen: spread of corruption and bribery, tax evasion, decline of the middle class in Lebanon, and poor distribution of wealth which is limited to 0.3% of the Lebanese citizens.

Responding to a question from Mr. Majid Bou Hadir on the possibility of strengthening the current pillars of the economy (financial sector, individual initiatives, remittances), the Former Minister Dr. Alain Hakim said that the best approach to strengthening the economy is through supporting the productive sectors and adopting fair tax policies that will stimulate these sectors.

At the end of the event, Father Naji Khalil expressed his gratitude to the guest speakers and the attendees for accepting the invitation and visiting the Shouf Campus. Father Khalil, the Dean of the FBAE Professor Fadi Karaa and Dr. Kassamany handed over the shields to Dr. Hakim, Dr. Bechara and Mr. Bou Hadir as a symbol of appreciation and gratefulness, in addition to honoring each of the outstanding students in the Faculty of Business Administration and Economics Hiba Al Ashkar and Razan Zaidan, who have won two awards through academic competitions among top universities in Lebanon.

"Driving Ethics"



The Faculty of Business Administration and Economics at the Shouf Campus invited the YASA Team on May 18, 2017 to deliver a presentation on Driving Ethics. The Team was composed of two distinguished guest speakers: Dr. Ziad Akel and ME Lahoud Lahoud.

Dr. Akel held a briefing about the impact of implementing road safety rules and regulations, as well as emphasizing the importance of the use of seatbelts, the dangers of speeding, and the fatal results of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. ME Lahoud emphasized the impact of road safety by providing the attendees with statistics about the new addiction to mobile phones. He explained how seriously implementing road rules decreased the number of deaths due to car accidents from 2014 to 2017 by 25 percent.

According to the 'Kouly Model', there are 5 key elements to achieve the ultimate purpose and extreme leadership:

- 1. Know yourself
- 2. Know others and understand them
- 3. Understand systems and strategies
- 4. Know authority and understand it
- 5. Acquire leadership skills

In his workshop, Mr. Kouly also distinguishes between managers and leaders. First of all, leaders have visions by inspiring, motivating, and helping others, while managers set goals to reach and achieve them which are often measured by profit and/or productivity, Despite the fact that managers avoid change, leaders adapt, love, and work for change. Managers learn from each other's, while leaders learn from their own visions and opinions. Leaders try to grow on their own by targeting long-term plans, while managers rely on existing skills and think of fulfilling short-term purposes. Leaders build relationships

through motivating, teaching, and coaching others on how to think, speak, and act, while managers give orders through developed systems.
