LERC honors three personalities contributing to the Japan-Lebanon

Under the patronage of the Japanese Embassy in Lebanon and in the presence of His Excellency Seiichi Otsuka, the Japan Ambassador to Lebanon, the Lebanese Emigration Research Center (LERC) at the University of Notre Dame-Louaize (NDU) honored Professor Marie Rose Abdel Jalil–Ishiguro, Professor Hidemitsu Kuroki from Tokyo University of Foreign Affairs (TUFS), and Ms. Madeleine Abdel Jalil-Umewaka for their respective efforts in promoting academic cooperation and for contributing to the Japan-Lebanon rapprochement.

Ms. Margot Nasir Abdul Jalil, aunt of the Jalil sisters, and their cousin Ms. Jacqueline Maamari accepted the award on their behalf. It is worth mentioning that they both got married to two Japanese men during the Lebanese war and moved to live in Japan, where Professor Marie Rose became a prolific writer on Christianity, Lebanon and the Middle East and where Ms. Madeleine became active in promoting the Japanese Noh Theater and the Lebanese-Japan relations. Dr. Kuroki received the award for advancing academic exchange between Lebanon and Japan and for bringing together Japanese scholars to work on Lebanese migration in the world.
